

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#### **PHILOSOPHY**

APHIDS is proudly artist-led — placing artist's practice at the centre of all that we do. As one of Naarm/Melbourne's longest standing experimental art organisations, APHIDS makes work that is socially engaged, outspoken, and political. Spanning theatrical, gallery-based and public art contexts, our projects are inspired by urgent issues and a passionate belief in the social impacts of art.

Every project we make starts with lived experience. This is central to the role that we play in the arts sector and requires us to play with form, break down barriers for engagement with experimental practice, and reach across the blurry edges of social, political and cultural divides. Our works are often developed through

research and conversation with citizen experts who become paid collaborators as the projects evolve into multi-form outcomes that have long life spans.

From our home at Collingwood Yards on unceded Kulin lands, we bring artists into meaningful exchange with the public through performance, critical dialogue, events, films and publications, as well as knowledge sharing through workshops and intergenerational dialogue. Working collaboratively, we prioritise bold experimentation. In the process of making work with, alongside, and around each other, we are creating a collaborative practice that is greater than the sum of its parts.

In 2023, APHIDS was led by Co-Director's Lara Thoms and Mish Grigor, alongside Executive Producer Anna Nalpantidis.

#### ARTISTIC DIRECTOR'S REPORT

2023 was a landmark year for APHIDS and our family of collaborators, with our largest ever co-commission OH DEER! premiering at RISING festival and then touring to TRANSFORM Festival UK. This work was made in collaboration with over 30 everyday people, artists and creatives, and it received critical and audience acclaim. It was particularly refreshing to have the support of an international partner to create a socially engaged connection with local UK artists, as each presentation is built through local workshops, interviews and improvisations. Performing at the beautiful Capitol Theatre and then the Leeds Playhouse were surreal and magical experiences. We thank our citizen experts for sharing their lived experience of losing a parent to make this special new work.

We also took another project about death on tour, to MONA FOMA Launceston, followed by PLATFORM arts Geelong and finishing in Austin, Texas for the brilliant Fusebox festival. Seeing *The Director* continue its long life is always a delight — new audiences open new lines of enquiry, and we are humbled by the long conversations at the end of each show. We were thrilled to be listed as one of the top shows of 2023 by The Guardian Australia.

Our Executive producer Anna Nalpantidis spearheaded a partnership with Melbourne's newest festival Now Or Never, where we worked with robots, chefs, dancers and academics to question technology for Gutful: Bug in the System at the State Library. Down the road Lara and Mish performed a season at the National Gallery of Victoria as part of the 10 year annual exhibition Melbourne Now, extending APHIDS' status in the visual arts community. Our local activity was very much noticed this year with APHIDS receiving the City of Melbourne's

highest accolade for our sector: the Melbourne Award for Arts and Events, an unexpected and delightful win alongside brilliant organisations and inspiring individuals.

Throughout the year we were supported by our brilliant TRIAD, who offered artistic guidance as well as participating in our program, most recently with Amarra Raheem's takeover of APHIDS LISTENS.

We said goodbye to executive producer Anna Nalpantidis in September. Anna treated the company with deep enthusiasm and commitment, and contributed significantly to APHIDS' growth. Her hard work was especially felt when we heard the news that we had secured four year funding 25–28 from Creative Australia, which gives us new sustainability, and security. We thank Anna, and are grateful as we consider what this significant shift in our company might mean for our work and for the community.

In 2023 we are proud to have supported artists and creatives directly with almost half a million dollars toward fees and wages, at a time when the arts industry feels particularly precarious. We feel totally lucky to work with such stellar teams of creatives, alongside our rigorous board, and to be supported by our donor family and government partners. It's been a powerful twelve months, and we are thrilled with all we have achieved.

See them make space for three artists Sammaneh Pourshafighi, Amaraa Raheem, and Amrita Hepi, to work in the company as a TRIAD. Carry on despite the departure of an excellent executive producer in Anna Nalpantidis. Keep a PHD on the boil. GET 4 YEAR FUNDING for 2025. Parent. Partner. Mourne. Grieve. Be Afraid. Be Kind. Be Alive.

Some might say the job of good governance is about succession and money. And that is true to a point. But governance is also about witnessing and holding space and being accountable to and in our relationships.

So it's been an honour to take up the position of Chair at APHIDS, a company that is compelled in its DNA to make exceptional, experimental socially engaged art, and support the work of Mish and Lara as they lead this 30 year old arts company. A big thank you to the exceptional Board Members including my dear friend and ex Chair Meredith Martin, who thankfully has remained on the Board and has provided great advice and support to us all in a year of big transitions.

I was proud to see APHIDS' huge contribution to the cultural life of Naarm being recognised in the winning of the Melbourne Award for arts events, City of Melbourne's highest accolade, *The Director* listed as one of the top shows in 2023 by Guardian Australia and prouder still to see them sign up as part of A Climate for Art union and divestment campaign and continue to Pay The Rent.

There's a lot at stake and the future awaits — APHIDS will take us there.

#### **APHIDS TRIAD**

This year, we welcomed three pals into the APHIDS family. It was a formalisation of relationships we already had, with people we already knew and loved — collaborators whose role extended beyond the lifespan of a project. It was special to feel like we could keep growing and shifting how we thought about 'APHIDS' as a collective identity.

The APHIDS Triad is an artistic brains trust made up of artists Sammaneh Pourshafighi, Amaraa Raheem, and Amrita Hepi. The Triad assisted in programming decisions, offered community consultation, and provided curatorial care to APHIDS projects and operations. They also collaborated directly on various APHIDS keynote projects and public programs including OH DEER! and APHIDS Listens.

Sammaneh Pourshafighi is a queer genderfluid Muslim who arrived in Australia as a refugee after the Iranian Revolution. Sammaneh is a hereditary witch, producer and multidisciplinary artist. After performing in *GUTFUL: Revolt!*, Sammaneh Pourshafighi developed *Over The Borderline* as part of Arts House Culture Lab.

**Dr Amaara Raheem** is a Sri Lankan born dance-artist, writer and researcher. As part of her time as Thinker in Residence with APHIDS, she is researching methods of 'in-residence' as ways to reveal alternative narratives within colonial and decolonial systems. Amaara also curated and hosted APHIDS Listens this year

Amrita Hepi is an award-winning First Nations choreographer and dancer from Bundjalung (Aus) and Ngapuhi (NZ) territories. Her mission as an artist is to push the barriers of intersectionality and make work that garners multiple access points. After working with APHIDS on DESTINY and Easy Riders she choreographed and performed in OH DEER!.







#### OH DEER!

RISING FESTIVAL, MELBOURNE TRANSFORM FESTIVAL, UK 15 – 17 June | 13 – 14 October 2023 The Capital Theatre, Leeds Playhouse

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A collection of performers who had all lost a parent gathered on stage, dressed as orphans from popular culture. There was Annie, Elsa, Frodo — a whole host of plucky parentless kids who had dusted themselves off and done extraordinary things. Followed by a camera, the performers were directed to act out scenes, slipping back and forth between the fictional characters they were inhabiting and their own experiences of loss.

After three months of group conversations, workshops and rehearsals APHIDS premiered this bold new work with 30 collaborators in Naarm, Melbourne as part of RISING festival and the APAM program at the magical Capitol theatre.

Three months later APHIDS reimagined *OH DEER!* by bringing together local performers in Leeds, UK with part of the original cast. Building in new stories and gestures, this iteration was our international premiere, and resulted in exciting collaborations, networks and artistic connections.

OH DEER! was commissioned through RISING's 2020 A Call to Artists initiative, a program supported by Creative Victoria and City of Melbourne and co-commissioned by Transform.

#### **GUTFUL: BUG IN THE SYSTEM**

NOW OR NEVER FESTIVAL, MELBOURNE 30 – 31 August 2023 State Library Victoria

'Food for thought and bottomless archival worm holes' — Rochelle Fong

Part-performance lecture, part-intervention, and part-snack pack, this event looked at bugs, food, technology, and breakdowns in popular culture.

As part of the new Now or Never festival, GUTFUL was a dynamic experience featuring crickets, millennium bugs, and sneaky robot waiters. Drawing from the State Library Victoria archives, GUTFUL asked the question: Is it a bug or is it a feature?

An event that liberated the food-free zone of the library with waste-combatting chef Furrmien, performance artist and researcher Catherine Ryan, dance artist Sarah Aiken, design by Quiggi, and proceedings by experimental performer Marcus lan McKenzie.

## DEAD RICH



#### **DEAD RICH**

MELBOURNE NOW, MELBOURNE
5 – 19 August 2023
Presented by the National Gallery of Victoria

DEAD RICH was a two-part performance lecture by APHIDS co-directors Mish Grigor and Lara Thoms. In two discrete and interlinked segments, DEAD RICH explored how lived experience infiltrates art practice in strange and unexpected ways. The lecture took its cues from autoethnographer and performance scholar Tami Spry's concept of the 'textualising body' — or what Spry describes as an unhierarchical 'collaboration between body, page and stage'. Through this lens, DEAD RICH attempted to use liveness, image, words, and bodies to portray and unpack the performance of class and death in present-day Australia.

The piece was segmented into two discrete halves. In the first half, Lara Thoms examined a life spent making art about death, and the economic ramifications of dying in Naarm, with the assistance of maths teacher Stefan Grudza. In the second half, Mish Grigor took on class consciousness through physicality, video and text. Over time Mish replaced herself with dancer Sarah Aiken, to contribute to this performance of abstraction.

This project was commissioned by the National Gallery of Victoria as part of the Melbourne Now Performance Program.

APHIDS were thrilled to perform *The Director* regionally in Launceston and Geelong and internationally in Austin, Texas. Presenting as part of two major festivals and in partnership with a growing regional venue allowed for new audiences, exchanges, conversations and networks.

The Director is a performance starring charismatic ex-funeral director, Scott Turnbull, and artist Lara Thoms. Together the pair demystify elements of the death industry, using humour and first-hand knowledge to dig a little deeper on what happens after we go. Blurring the roles of funeral director and theatre director, Thoms and Turnbull ask each other to perform tasks, share knowledge and give feedback on each other's actions. Balancing macabre reality, playfulness and the tragic elements of death, the result is a spiky, funny and invigorating performance.

#### OH DEER!

'The performance pokes away at our culture's strange orphan fetish, which it undercuts with brutally honest glimpses of the reality of bereavement. The performers drop small but telling details, which are often equally funny and devastating. But they also leave plenty of space around their topic, as if to acknowledge the impossibility of ever being comprehensive. Through this delicate, simple and playful approach, Aphids make room for a real reckoning with what grief means.'

#### IN DEVELOPMENT

#### **OVER THE BORDERLINE**

OVER THE BORDERLINE is a collaboration with cross-artform queer artist Samanneh Pourshafighi. In partnership with Arts House, this new performance will interrogate how border control, queerness and popular culture intersect — starting with how Australian refugee tribunals expect people to prove their queerness through a Western lens.

#### I AM INVISIBLE

I Am Invisible is a new socially engaged performance that explores care work, visibility and the healthcare industry. Drawing on interviews with Mish Grigor's mother — a nurse — I Am Invisible asks why certain labour is undervalued, underpaid, and unnoticed; and considers what our society would be if all the hidden domestic and emotional workers disappeared for real. The work will combine Grigor's signature humour, storytelling, and philosophical musings, along with a few disappearing acts.

#### **PLAYING DEAD**

A documentary team led by Director Gena Riess followed the cast of *OH DEER!* throughout 2023. The film is a one hour character-driven, multi-narrative documentary that intimately follows the transformative journey of a diverse group of strangers who have all lost a parent. Joined by cinematographer Marleena Forward and producer Madeleine Martiniello this work is set to premiere in 2024 in film festivals globally.





#### SUPERMASSIVE AND SUPERDRIVE

SUPERMASSIVE supports interdisciplinary artists to engage with the APHIDS ethos of creating urgent art for urgent times, with a program of mentorships, workshops, internships and exchange.

#### SUPERMASSIVE Mentorship — Sylva Venus Storm

Sylva Storm is an interdisciplinary artist practicing on the unceded lands of the Wurundjeri Woi-Wurrung people of the Kulin Nation. Their practice is engaged in the intersectional membrane between corporeality and relationality. They are interested in where the body meets the artwork, resulting in a charged site for mark making and dialogue. Sylva did a production internship on *OH DEER!* as part of RISING for their RMIT studies and then toured the work with the company to Transform Festival in Leeds.

## SUPERMASSIVE Drop In Centre Collingwood Yards, December 14

APHIDS invited experimental artists to book in for a free SUPERMASSIVE session. APHIDS sought form-disrupting Victorian-based artists to meet and discuss their practice with Co-Directors Mish Grigor and Lara Thoms in an individual (or collective) 30-minute session in the studio.

Together they connected artists to the places, spaces, and people to take their work to the next level.

SUPERDRIVE is APHIDS' program where co-directors join mid-career women and non-binary artists to build a project to the next level. These include dramaturgy, directing, producing, auspicing and strategic supporting roles to co-build a future for new work. 2023 projects included:

#### **RINSE**

A solo dance work by choreographer and First Nations artist Amrita Hepi that explores the romance of beginnings and what happens next, when those initial thrills begin to fade and inertia takes over.

Directed by Mish Grigor, Fusebox Festival, USA.

#### THE READ


Pieces for Small Spaces is a program that Lucy Guerin Inc. has produced annually since 2005. Three choreographers are invited to create a short dance work, with the aim of developing their choreographic ideas and their own personal approach to the choreographic process. Mish Grigor was invited to dramaturg new work by triad member Amrita Hepi, whose piece The Read explores the body in professional service in a collaboration between a choreographer/dancer and a sex worker.
